Canadian Militia Born Outside Canada 1907

Overview

The 1,991 men in this database constitute 3.7 per cent of the authorized establishment of the Canadian Militia: 4,188 officers and 46,891 non-commissioned officers and men. As of March 31, 1907, the Permanent Active Force establishment was 2,737.

Nearly three-quarters of the men—1,467—were born in England, 266 were Irish, and 149 were Scottish. The next most numerous birthplaces were Wales, India, the United States, Australia, the Channel Islands, France, and Newfoundland.

More than half (1,012) of the 1,991 indexed men were stationed in the Halifax military district. The Montreal district accounted for 286 men and Toronto, 246. Their median age was 26, the youngest being 15, the oldest 78. The most numerous ranks were 742 privates, 460 gunners, 106 sappers, 57 lance corporals, 93 corporals, and 237 sergeants of various designations.

Income earned

With the exception of 14 described as *Boy*, who were paid \$156, the lowest annual income was \$182.50 for newly recruited privates. This was the pay for two weeks of training during the summer and their availability to be called out in time of need. At the other end of the scale, earning \$6,000 annually, were two brigadier-generals in the Permanent Active Force at the headquarters in Ottawa. Across the country 44 foreign-born officers earned more than \$1,000.

The original source document for the database is *Sessional papers of the Dominion of Canada 1907-1908_Paper No. 94*, pp. 974–1024. It records that the Senate asked for the information on February 12, 1907, and that the response came on January 22, 1908.
