- Key areas for Irish Research: journals and periodicals; how-to manuals and reference works; geography via maps and gazetteers, Ordnance Survey and Place-Name guides; history and information by county; cemetery listings; migration and settlement in Canada and the US.
- Teams are working on adding description to the catalog for books and journals a work in progress.

We have many resources related to the Irish famine, the economic conditions which led to it and the migration associated with it. A few items of note are:

- Irish famines before and after the Great Hunger (published in 2020), edited by Christine Kinealy and Gerard Moran. A wide-ranging collection of essays, recommended by a 2021 BIFHSGO Conference speaker.
- The famine in Ulster: the regional impact. Examines the impact of the famine in specific counties including Antrim, Armagh, Cavan, Donegal, Down, Fermanagh, Londonderry, Monaghan and Tyrone.
- The Graves are Walking: The Great Famine and The Saga of the Irish People (added in 2021)
